The Cathedral

In 1827, Catholicism began in the islands at this very location. In 1839, King Kamehameha III allowed the legal establishment of the Hawai'i Catholic Church. The very next year, construction began on The Cathedral of Our Lady of Peace - a cathedral that would be the birthplace of Hawai'i's Catholic history.

As a dwelling place of the Divine and the center of sacramental life, this cathedral must be preserved as a beacon of Christ's presence and the spiritual home of the faithful.



The Project

PHASE 1 - COMPLETED - RAISED \$6.8M

- Repair of termite damage in upper galleries
- Expansion of sanctuary and installation of backdrop and canopy for cathedra (Bishop's chair)
- Painting of portraits of St. Damien and St. Marianne (in apse)
- Bell tower restoration
- Installation of burial spaces for Bishops
- Planning and permitting

PHASE 2 - CURRENT - GOAL OF \$25M

- Construction of Reliquary Chapel for remains of St. Marianne and relic of St. Damien
- Construction of an immersion baptismal font, with a poem about Baptism engraved in Hawaiian on each of the sides
- Installations of new marble altar with panels for each island, with the flower of the island
- Transformation of current altar into ambo/pulpit
- Addition of St. Michael the Archangel Chapel to honor Veterans and Military personnel
- Refurbished stained glass windows and pipe organ
- Creation of a donor recognition wall for major donors
- Construction of new confessionals
- Restoration of the Stations of the Cross
- Establishment of an Endowment Fund to assure proper maintenance of the Cathedral in the future

Maui Island

The Lokelani rose will represent the Island of Maui on the Altar. Each of the eight major islands will be represented with a island flower mosaic across all four sides of the altar. This symbolizes how Catholicism unites us and that the Cathedral is a place of worship for all here.
